

This United Nations style children's conference was planned by Jane Cradock (Belle Vue Primary) and Pam Copeland of B&C Educational Ltd with support from Anne Calvert and Janette Lamb (Northfield Road) and Des Bowden. It was hosted by Dave Porter, head of Belle Vue Primary School, Wordsley.

The conference was opened with messages of goodwill from The Gambia. Mr Yahya Al-Matar Jobe, Secretary General for the Gambian National Commission of UNESCO encouraged the delegates to learn from each other and to recognise that other people have good ideas

as well. Mrs Haddy Njie, head of Bakau Newtown Lower Basic School hoped that they would have a challenging and enjoyable conference.

The conference started with a welcome from Jane and Pam and then the children were offered a Gambian meal called domada, which is chicken cooked with groundnuts (peanuts) and served with rice. Many children practised their skills of eating their meal with their fingers, before moving on to a series of learning activities leading up to a formal debate which considered the motion that "...it was better to live in The Gambia rather than UK. The activities were concluded by a set of African songs performed by Netherbrook Primary School's choir.
